Diagramming: Step-By-Step

- 1. Identify the sentence type, either declarative, interrogative, or imperative.
 - -If it is declarative, move to step 2.
 - -If it is interrogative, rewrite as declarative and move to step 2.
 - -If it is imperative, (you) is the subject. Move to step 2.
- 2. Identify and circle all prepositional phrases and deal with those later. At this point they only clutter things up.
- 3. Identify the subject(s) and verb(s). Watch out for compound parts. Don't forget that verb phrases always stay together.
- 4. Determine if the verb is action or linking.
 - -If it is action, check to see if there is something receiving that action. If so, there is a direct object that needs to be expressed in the diagram following a vertical line, sitting on the horizontal.
 - -If there is no direct object, move on to step 5.
 - -If it is a linking verb, identify it and diagram the predicate noun or predicate adjective it links back to the subject, following a back-slanting line, sitting on the horizontal.
- 5. Identify and diagram any modifiers (adjectives or adverbs)
- 6. Look back at the prepositional phrases you circled. Determine what word(s) they are modifying and diagram accordingly.
- 7. Read the diagram and see if it will reflect the original sentence. Double check for your capital letter signifying the beginning of the sentence.
