Six-Word Memoir Step-by-Step

- 1. List as many words and phrases as you can about yourself. Use nouns, adjectives, adverbs, verbs -- anything, just write down whatever represents what you like, what you do, how you do it, how you describe yourself, how others describe you...) 3 minutes
- 2. Circle two to three words or phrases from this list that stand out and could express a story or something representative of who you are/what you have done. **1 minute**
- 3. Pick one of those two to three things and Freewrite on that topic. Write whatever comes to mind. It's a Freewrite, so just write. **3 minutes**
- 4. Box in words and phrases within this Freewrite that synthesize (tie together and express a new thought) an idea that represents you. **1 minute**
- 5. Using strong action verbs, expressive adjectives and adverbs, specific nouns, and purposeful punctuation, write this idea that represents *you*, using only six deliberately chosen words.
- 6. Edit and revise until your Six-Word Memoir tells a story about you that provides your audience with insights into who and what you're all about.
 - -Because you're telling a story that represents who you are in only six words, the specific words you choose and how you arrange them will take time to get right.

 Expect to spend some time on steps 5 and 6. Be sure to write your way through this process. Don't just stare at a blank sheet of paper.

Revision Guide:

- Does your memoir tell or suggest a story that is special to you?
- Does that story reveal an idea or insight that is unique and important to you?
 - Not just what you've done, but how or why you did it and/or why it matters to you.
- Does your memoir use a specific <u>structure</u> that helps to better express this idea or insight?
 - Single phrase or clause
 - Patterns of words or phrases: pairs of words, list, half and half, repetition. . .
 - Relationships: cause/effect, question/answer, contrasting elements,
 main heading w/subtext
- Does your memoir use writing conventions and literary elements?
 - Punctuation: colon, comma, exclamation point, period, question mark, parenthesis, brackets . . .
 - Do you use figurative language? (metaphor, simile, hyperbole, personification)
 - Do you play with sound devices? (alliteration, consonance, rhyme, onomatopoeia,)
 - Are there powerful verbs? Expressive adjectives or adverbs? Specific nouns?
